

Vancouver's Solid Waste & Minimum Property Maintenance Code

Inoperable Vehicles

Vancouver Municipal Code 17.14 prohibits open storage of solid waste. It also restricts open storage of inoperable vehicles to no more than seven days.

Vancouver Municipal Code 6.12.110 (a) (b) also requires every residence maintain minimum garbage service.

Solid Waste is defined in the City code as all forms of waste, including but not limited to garbage, household animal waste, dead animals under 200 pounds, bags, pesticide containers, fireplace or grill ashes, industrial waste, swill and demolition or construction waste.

It does not include industrial byproducts, sewage, hazardous wastes or recyclable materials that have been sorted and set out for recycling purposes.

An Inoperable Vehicle is a vehicle that is missing a component, such as a wheel(s), engine, battery, transmission or fuel tank; or a vehicle that is not able to move 100 feet in forward or reverse under its own power; or a vehicle that does not meet the required equipment provision of RCW Chapter 46.37.



Open Storage refers to the storage of materials or property not customarily associated with outdoor use not contained inside of a fully enclosed building.



Open storage does not include items associated with normal use of the property, such as lawn furniture, play equipment, gardening equipment and similar items.

Open storage also does not include construction materials or seasonal materials that are stored in a manner that protects them and prevents deterioration and that are expected to be used on the property within six months (wood chips, mulch, plant/garden materials, shingles, ladders, etc.).

What Happens When a Complaint is Received?

Typically, a City inspector will visit the property to verify the complaint. If violations are confirmed, typically the City will then send a letter to the property owner or resident describing the complaint and requesting corrective action be taken.

Recipients of a code violation letter will:

- have an opportunity to discuss the situation with City staff, and
- will be given a specific and reasonable amount of time to correct the violation.

If no corrective action is taken, the City may issue a **Notice of Civil Violation and Order** to the property owner and/or resident. This may result in monetary fines and may be appealed to a City-appointed Hearings Examiner.

If the violation is not corrected within the time allowed, the City may charge the violator with a misdemeanor in District Court, and seek penalties and remedies upon conviction.
