Proclamation

- WHEREAS, the United States of America is a nation founded on the principles of liberty and justice for all, yet our nation has a moral stain and terrible history of slavery with a legacy of systemic racism, inequality, and inhumanity; and
- WHEREAS, President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1st, 1863, which gave freedom to Black enslaved people in the United States of America; and
- WHEREAS, freedom became a reality much later for Black enslaved people in Texas on June 19th, 1865, over two years after the Emancipation Proclamation was signed; and
- WHEREAS, as one of the oldest US holidays, Juneteenth marks our country's second Independence Day, commemorating and celebrating the freeing of formerly enslaved individuals and their descendants. Honoring the tireless work to deliver the promise of America for all Americans; and
- WHEREAS, It has historically been a time of prayer, reflection, and honoring achievements with community and family gatherings; and
- WHEREAS, Juneteenth also highlights all the achievements collectively through the pre and post Middle Passage, the slave trade, the emancipation era, Jim Crow era and the Civil Rights Movement, as well as recent and current accomplishments of descendants of black enslaved people; and
- WHEREAS, although Juneteenth is specific to the emancipation of African descendants, its message promotes the continued freedom and economic prosperity of individuals from all races, colors, creeds, and cultures; and
- WHEREAS, African Americans continue to struggle for true freedom and for full and equal protection, and we commit ourselves to recognizing and eliminating institutional and systemic racism and the consequences thereof within the City; and
- WHEREAS, Festivities this year include a Juneteenth event on Saturday, June 15th at Esther Short Park where we celebrate the opportunity to stand united in freedom.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Anne McEnery-Ogle, Mayor of Vancouver, Washington, do hereby proclaim the 19th day in June as:

“ Juneteenth 2024 ”

in the City of Vancouver and encourage our community to become more aware of the significance of this celebration in African American history and our nation and to recognize those who fought for and continue to fight for equality.
