
Medallion Program

River are some of the important waterways that support all life in our ecoregion. These water bodies are influenced by our long rainy (and snowy) season, from October to May. The water fills lakes and rivers, soaks into wetlands, recharges aquifers and flows to the ocean. In populated areas, when rainwater flows over yards and roadways, pollutants can be picked up and carried with the water as it travels to the closest storm drain.

Most stormwater drains lead directly to water sources like streams and rivers, so it's important that only rain
