Love your Pet? License it....

Not only is it the law to license your cats or dog in the city, but licensing your pets have many benefits to you and your community.

- It provides proof of ownership if your pet is lost or stolen
 - Your pet won't be mistaken as a stray. Animal Control or the Humane Society will make sure you are reunited with your pet as soon as possible.
- Pet licensing provides proof of rabies vaccination, provides longer care periods at shelters, and ensures emergency veterinarian treatment if necessary
- Licensing fees also support officer response to your neighborhood, animal cruelty and neglect investigations, and public outreach education opportunities.

RU Article – What is Household Hazardous Waste?

The easiest way to determine if a product is hazardous is to read the label. Words like “Danger”, “Poison”, “Warning”, or “Caution” are clear giveaways that you’re dealing with hazardous material. The words “Poison” and “Danger” specifically indicate the highest hazard levels.

- **Poison** means that a product is highly toxic and can cause injury or death if ingested, inhaled, or absorbed through the skin.
- **Danger** means that a product is highly toxic, flammable, or corrosive. Products labeled “Danger” may also be poisonous and can potentially cause serious skin or eye damage or easily cause a fire. “Danger” can be found on various cleaners, polishes, paint strippers, and pesticides.

Any product labeled with the above words should **never** go into the garbage at home. Instead, they should be taken to a Hazardous Waste facility at any of the three transfer stations in Clark County. Residents can bring products for free on certain days of the week. Visit www.columbiareourcecompany.com to check the camera for a real-time idea of possible lines at the transfer stations.

What can I bring to the Household Hazardous Waste Facility?

- **Aerosol products (NO compressed gas cylinders)** – All varieties, including paint, cleaners, pesticides, etc.
- **Fire Extinguishers**
- **Automotive products** – Used motor oil (up to five gallons), antifreeze, gasoline, vehicle batteries, engine cleaners, degreasers, transmission fluid, oil filters
- **Batteries** – Household (AA, AAA, C, D, NiCad, Lithium, Mercury)
- **Corrosives** – acid or alkaline
- **Fluorescent bulbs, tubes, and ballasts**

- **Household Cleaners** – Disinfectant, furniture strippers, oven cleaners, floor cleaners, waxes and polish,
- **Medications (NO controlled substances)**
- **Mercury Items** – thermometers, thermostats, switches
- **Paints and solvents** – Turpentine, kerosene, rust remover, paint thinner, deck stains, concrete sealer
- **Poisons and Pesticides** – Fungicides, herbicides (including fertilizers with weed killer), insecticides, and rodenticides
- **Pool, spa, and photographic chemicals**
- **Propane** – Up to 5 gallons

Household Hazardous Waste Facilities do not accept: Any amounts greater than 25 gallons or 200 pounds, leaking containers, asbestos, explosives or ammunition, radioactive material, infectious waste, or business generated waste.

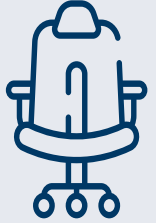
Reduce, Reuse, Recycle works for food, too! Reducing food waste and keeping it out of the garbage has many benefits. Plan and shop smart for meals. Store and use leftovers. Compost food scraps with your curbside Organics service and/or backyard compost system.



Convenient curbside pickup for bulky items

cityofvancouver.us/bulkyitempickup

All Waste Connections customers are eligible for free pickups each year. One free pickup of an appliance, such as freezer or refrigerator. And one free pickup of up to five bulky items, such as mattresses or broken furniture.



Additional curbside pickups are available any time of year for a fee. When items are in good condition, consider finding a donation option at recyclinga-z.com.

Anti-freeze, batteries and motor oil: Curbside collection and drop-off locations

Your garbage and recycling service includes collection of used anti-freeze, batteries and motor oil. Follow the guidelines below for correct preparation for setting out at your curb.

Anti-freeze and motor oil:

1. Pour into an empty one-gallon plastic jug with a screw-top lid.
2. Use separate containers for oil and antifreeze; do not mix.
3. Place jug(s) next to your recycling cart. Use a location where jugs won't be hit by vehicles.



Batteries:

1. Tape the ends.
2. Place in a sealed, clear plastic bag.
3. Place on top of your recycle cart lid.

Household sizes include alkaline and rechargeable AA, AAA, C, D, button cell, 9 volt and other similar sized batteries. Lithium-ion, vehicle or other lead acid batteries are not accepted.
