Capital Budget \$0.6 billion

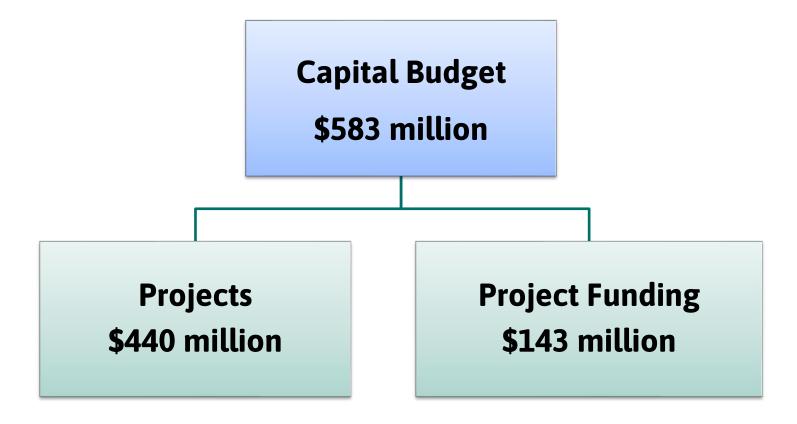

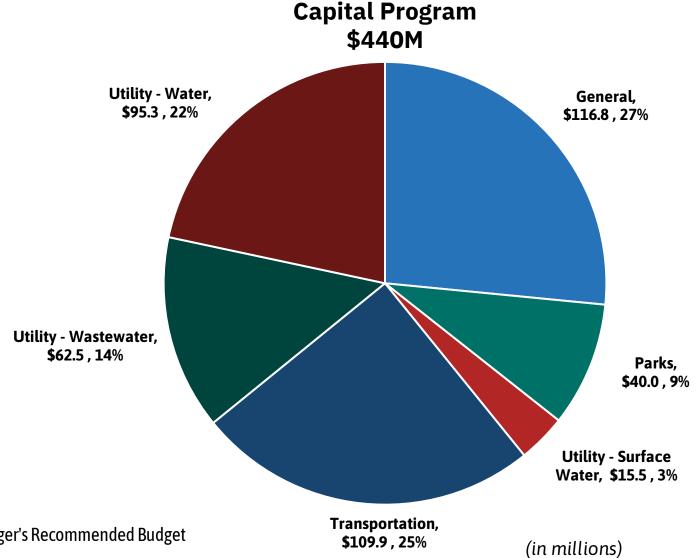

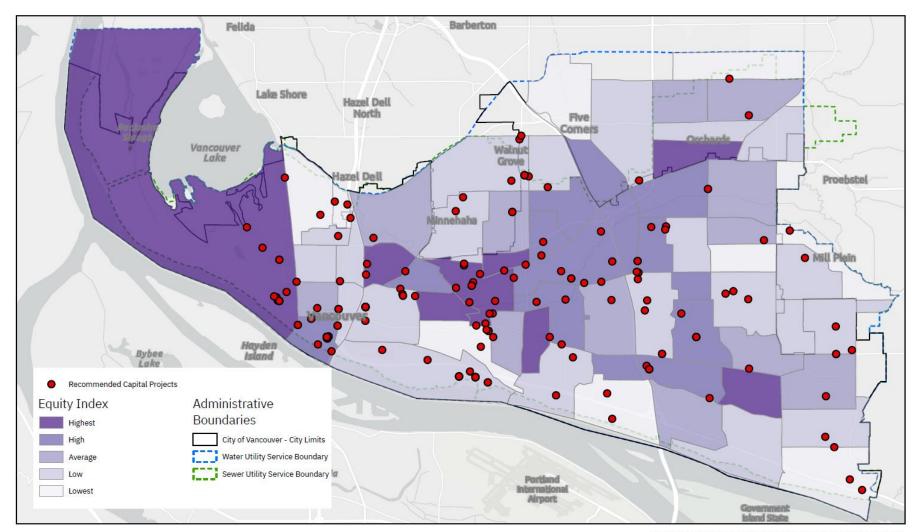

New/Expanded Funding Sources for Capital

- Request TBD to implement an additional \$10 license fee for Transportation (bringing the total to \$50/year/vehicle)
- Commercial Parking Tax (Transportation)
- Admissions Tax (both, operating and capital)
- B&O on Retailing (operating and capital)
- Lodging Tax: New \$800K per year dedicated to invest into eligible capital projects, as allocated by the Lodging Tax Advisory Committee
- New Culture and Arts Sales Tax: 90% dedicated to Capital investment into eligible Arts and Culture facilities
- Expanded BLS (fees increased annually through 2030, per VMC)
- PIFs (fees increased annually through 2026, per VMC)





Budget Ordinances



Budget Ordinances

- 2025-26 Budget Ordinance and Financial Policies Resolution
- Property Tax Ordinances
 - Recommend a 1% increase for 2025
- Utility Rate increase ordinances:
 - 6% annual increase, weighted
 - Change the basis to all gross revenues
- Special license fees adjusted for inflationary pressures
- Credit card company fees are to be passed to consumers



Budget Ordinances (continued)

- Fire Marshal's fees, land use and other fee updates
- New Taxes
 - Cable utility excise tax 6%
 - o Commercial parking tax \$0.15 per transaction in lots and \$0.20 for street
 - Admissions Tax on Movie Theatres (w/ more than two screens) 5%
 - B&O Tax \$0.001/\$1,000 on Retailing
 - Cultural Access Sales Tax 1/10 of 1%
- Recommend to TBD: to increase license fee by \$10 effective 7/1/25



Property Tax Ordinances

• 1% Inflationary Increase:

- WA State law allows for an annual property tax levy increase of the lower implicit price deflator (IPD) or 1%, whichever is lower
- Preliminary estimate of the City of Vancouver assessed value citywide: \$37.9B, increase is 3.9%, inclusive of new construction
- Estimated 2025 levy rate (inclusive of Proposition 2 levy lid increase) will decline from \$2.09/\$1,000 AV to between \$2.03/\$1,000 AV and \$1.98/\$1,000



Property Tax Ordinances (continued)

Affordable Housing Property Tax:

- Proposition 3 Approved by voters for 2024-2033
- \$10 million annually
- Separate ordinance for 0% increase in 2025, since levy is set at the dollar amount
- Rate will slightly decline from \$0.27/\$1,000

Ad Valorem:

- Part of the standard requirement for annual property tax ordinances
- Confirms the City is relying on property taxes to fund its services



City-Owned Utility Rate/Tax Ordinances

- Blended 6% annual rate increase to incorporate inflationary cost increases and increased capital program:
 - Water Utility 4.5% per year
 - Wastewater Utility 6% per year
 - Surface Water Utility 8% per year
 - Solid Waste Utility already approved
- Tiered Rate (Water) structure implemented
- Basis of Utility Taxes updated to Gross Revenues

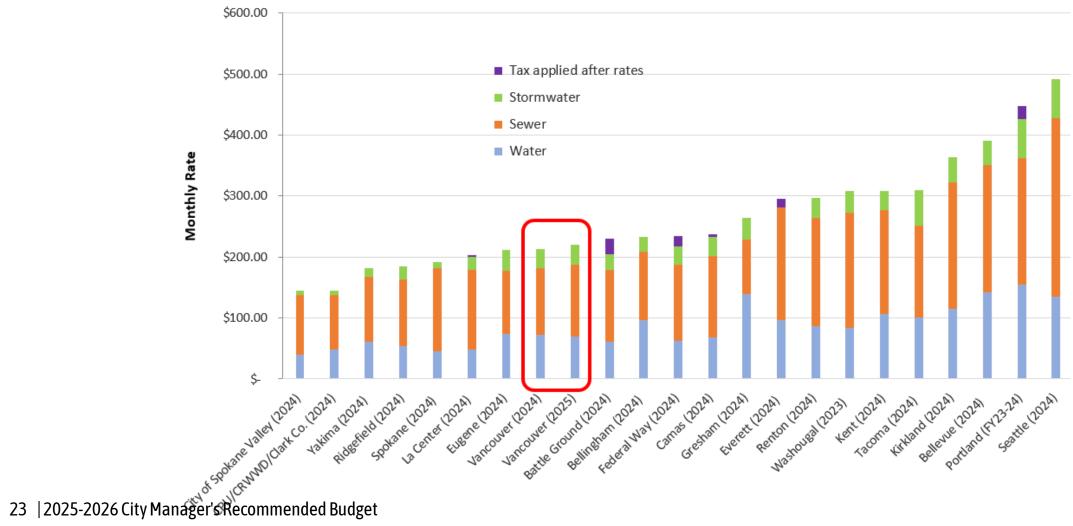

Fire Marshal's Fees Update Ordinance

- Effective Date 1/1/2025
- Updated Fees
 - Smoke Control Systems
 - Flammable/Comb Tank Demo
- New Fees
 - Special Hazard Review
 - Emergency Responder Radio
 - Technical Assistance Fire Review
 - Opportunity Expedited Fire Plan Review
- Realignment with the 2021 International Fire Code
- Consolidating VFD's development review standards and Title 16 into one



Credit Card Fees Ordinance

• Effective 1/1/2025

Annual Revenue ~\$1.2 mil

- Pass to customers the 2-4% transaction fees on credit/debit cards used by consumers to pay for city services
- Will be implemented city-wide for all city services
- There will be an option to avoid the fee by paying with cash or checks.



NEW – Cable Utility Excise Tax – 6%

Effective date - 1/1/2025

Annual Revenue ~\$1.9 Mil

○ Rate 6%

- General fund operating support unrestricted
- o Impacts to cable providers; ultimate impact to subscribers



NEW: Commercial Parking Tax (capital)

Effective date: 1/1/2026

○ Annual Revenue ~\$500K

- Dedicated to supporting Transportation investments
- Will apply to short-term public and private parking
- o Rate:
 - \$0.15 charge per transaction in parking lots
 - \$0.20 charge per transaction on street



NEW – Admissions Tax 5%

Effective Date1/1/2025

Annual Revenue \$400K

○ Rate 5%

- Applies to movie theatres with more than one screen
- Oupports:
 - Arts Hub design and operating
 - -Advancing Performing Arts Center feasibility



NEW – B&O Tax \$0.001 on Retailing

Effective Date1/1/2026

Annual Revenue \$7.1 Mil

Rate on Retailing Sector
 \$0.001 (\$1 per \$1,000)

- "Retailing" means the activity of engaging in making sales at retail
- Dedicated to the construction and operations of the future new 150-bed homeless bridge shelter
- ~\$200k annual administrative costs
- Follows the Model B&O ordinance developed by AWC and consistent with requirements as stated in RCW 35.102.040



NEW Tax – Arts and Culture Sales Tax

Effective Date

1/1/2026

(7 year duration)

Annual Revenue

\$7.1 Million

- 0.1% Sales Tax in Vancouver city limits
- Supports:
 - -Student access to culture and arts (5%)
 - -Expanded Culture Grants program (\$325K per year)
 - -Capital investment in new cultural facilities in the Vancouver Arts District
