The annual Sakura Festival on the Clark College main campus celebrates the anniversary of the gift of 100 Shirofugen cherry trees to the City of Vancouver from John Kageyama, President of America Kotobuki Electronics, Inc. to commemorate the 100th anniversary of Washington's statehood. On April 11, 1990, as a celebration of Arbor Day and Earth Day, the trees were planted on Clark College's main campus in Vancouver's Central Park. Police Report-Lee Gelsinger Mill Plain sound wall camp is decommissioned. They were down there last week and not a single person was there anymore. For those that didn't have a place to go, they moved to the Share House. That's where they get most of their services. Bridge shelter won't open until probably 2026. The shelter will be located near the mall. Outreach will be on-site. Vehicles has been a focus and RV's are showing up again.

Prius's on south side of McLoughlin-most of them are registered and okay to be on the street. Some were tagged and they disappeared. They are valid cars and not stolen. They can't be doing major repairs. Gelsinger is staying on top of it and periodically checking on it.

Treasurer Report- Dec. 2024 ending balance was 6,690.17 between checking, savings and our CD. So far in 2025 we have printed 2 ad sheets and one sponsored payment.

City of Vancouver: Brent Waddle Fourth Plain and F street update: Weather dependent for the striping. Could be done in mid to late April or if bad weather, May. Question about the traffic backing up now that there is one lane and it's a left turn (heading east) onto F St. Brent will look into it. Also is it allowed to turn onto E St now that the no turn sign is gone?

Main Street Promise-It's a big overhaul. Doing 2 blocks at a time. Check CoV website if you want an update.

Port Of Vancouver: Julie Rawls Lecture series kicked off. The first one was about the Maritime Museum which is undergoing a huge expansion. The next one is the 19th-Heads of the Port talking about how the Port works. All lectures are free. The next one after that is April 3rd, talking about all the Ports in Washington State. We have the most Ports in the U.S. All the Ports are very different from each other.

Today a school bus of kids from White Pass, WA. came to visit the Port. We tried to show them the types of careers outside of their community.

Question: Who collects the Tariffs from exports? Not sure. Soybean orders have been canceled.

We have been preparing to lose aluminum business but are going to start handling soda ash. It is mined in the U.S.

Arnada News:

Doc Reiss-Going to talk about the ad program and improvements to it. It's a nice sales sheet but he feels it's a little misdirected. There are a lot of young professionals with families who have money who desire to be social. Gave us a sample Sponsorship Sales sheet with a little about the neighborhood and the neighborhood statistics included. It also gives a reason to purchase an ad and what it supports. Recommended to change the Rent vs Own column for the numbers to add up. Talked about how we are having a problem getting the newsletter into the apartments-he is willing to look into it. Possible solution is to get the businesses to distribute the newsletter so those residents can get the newsletter. Could do a brochure holder with the newsletter and then a QR code on it for those who want it digitally. A question is can we increase our order with the City on the number of newsletters that are printed? We all agree to pursue this. Jill Bachmann-Easter Egg Hunt in the Arnada Park. It was very successful last year with 17 kids + their families. We would like to do it again-April 19th 11:00 a.m. Rain or Shine. Last year they spent \$149.16 for the eggs, candy, stickers, toys, and lawn decorations. It could be around \$85 this year if we don't do the stickers. They also had golden eggs -\$2 bills and Ice Cream Renaissance \$5 gift cards. See if Ice Cream Renaissance can donate this year. We are saying that it may be more so ask for up to \$200. They don't think they will need that much. Friday night before the event 7 p.m.-reserved the big table at Trap Door and adults stuffed the eggs. The Board approves up to \$200.

Ken Visser-Vancouver Neighborhood Alliance meeting last night. As far as neighborhood association insurance, they are going to charge \$100 per neighborhood.

Ivy pull is needed at the park. Recommend that it happens May 31st @ 10 a.m. We will need the dumpster for it.

We will discuss at the meeting next month-Summer events and a speaker from the Library. Ideas are street mural, concert-same group or the Ne Pluss Jazz? Food? Clark County Historical Museum tour-Sandi will check on that.
